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

Research as Data

WHAT KIND(S) OF DATA DO YOU HAVE?
WHAT RESEARCH QUESTIONS DO YOU WANT TO ADDRESS?

Texts

One document; a large corpus; translations; paleography.

Objects

portable objects; museum collections; monuments; artifacts; provenance.

Ephemeral

Three-dimensional spaces; events.

Archaeology

Legacy data; excavation reports; field notebooks; current dig information.

Places

Locations; infrastructure; networks; routes.



DATA COLLECTION

- Be specific about what you are collecting and why.
- Organize the workflow and choose tools to fit the task at hand.
- Consider longevity: will your tools and equipment be available beyond grad school?
- Document sources and decisions along the way.
- Use controlled vocabularies for consistency and connection to others.
- Make ethical decisions about sensitive data (eg: people, cultural heritage, monument locations).

- Omeka.net is free
- Omeka.org (needs a web hosting service)
- Reclaim Hosting web hosting service
 - o lots of tools/software, not just Omeka
 - annual fee
- other web hosting services (with annual fee)
- GitHub (free, can be used to launch websites)
- Humanities Commons (free WordPress sites)
- Hosted tools (freeware)
 - proprietary vs open source
- Proprietary considerations: ads, data collection, lack of agency, unexpected changes
- Your institution: Library, DH lab or center, Digital Scholarship lab, microgrants, Domain of One's Own (Reclaim Hosting provided by institution)
